ROY SEWALL JUDGES END OF YEAR COMPETITION

Roy Sewall is one of the leading photographers of the Potomac River and Chesapeake and Ohio (C&O) Canal.

Although he spent most of his youth in India, Pakistan, Indonesia, and the Philippines, his State Department family's home base was the Washington, D.C. area. Roy has a BS in Physics from Case Institute of Technology in Cleveland and an MS in Engineering Science from Penn State. He returned permanently to the Washington area in 1969 and worked for several major technology corporations for over 30 years.

Roy's interest in photography evolved from extensive travel in six continents. In 2001, he started his transition to full-time photographer. He always found the Washington area to be one of the most photogenic locations in the world. Roy's first photography book, *Our Potomac, from Great Falls through Washington, D.C.*, was published in 2005; it was inspired by his affection for hiking and bicycling along the river and the adjacent C&O Canal. The book has led to numerous lecture and slide show engagements with local organizations.

In 2007, Roy became the first Chair of the Board of Directors for the C&O Canal Trust. a non-profit friends group for the National Park Service. Roy has done extensive photography work for river- and C&O Canal-related government and non-profit organizations, as well as private and commercial clients. Roy's second book, Great Falls and Mather Gorge, was published in 2009. After completing Great Falls and Mather Gorge, Roy turned to the creation of large fine art prints. He has developed diverse bodies of work for exhibitions that include unusual foreign and domestic sites, historical re-enactment, and abstracts.

He has been an active member of the North Bethesda Camera Club since 2001 and frequently judges for camera clubs in the Northern Virginia area. CCC was fortunate to have him judge the end of year ito have to have him judge the end of year awards. He wastes no words, but communicates clearly and precisely what is right with each image, what can be improved, and, most importantly, how it could have been improved.

As a result, one of his images was published in the magazine and exhibited in the Smithsonian Institution. He has also judged and presented programs at numerous camera clubs; he visited CCC in May of 2010.


As a judge, Sherwin feels that no one should take judging too seriously—it is the opinion of one person, and the next judge would most probably choose (or not choose) another photo. The judge sees the images briefly and the impact registers in a short period of time; often the most lasting images need more time taken to really see them. He stated that comments are the most important facet of critiquing, and that is where the learning takes place. In judging Sherwin looks for a creative and novel subject or an angle he has never seen, or a subject he has seen many times presented in a novel way. His comments were clear and informative as he talked about the entries.

SHERWIN KAPLAN SPEAKER AND JUDGE FOR NOVEMBER

Sherwin Kaplan has been a member of the Northern Virginia Photographic Society since 1986 and has served in various NVPS Board positions, including President in 1990-91.

He has been NVPS' "Photographer of the Year" six times in the Advanced Slides competition category, won NVPS' "Slide of the Year" twice in that category and, when he competed in GWCCC competitions, won numerous awards, including First Place in Master or Advanced competitions in the Architectural, Pictorial and Nature categories. Three of his slides were included

Sherwin's program, "Light and Composition," was a slide presentation consisting of landscapes, cityscapes, flora and fauna. He pointed out that early morning and late afternoon or evening light is traditionally used by photographers to produce the "best" images, but there is no such thing as bad light. He showed us photos taken in less than ideal light and talked about why each one of them was worth taking, and how to take advantage of the light you are standing in.

You will receive two points for each entry in the Assigned topic, and one point for entries in the Open and Creative categories. You may submit only ONE (l) entry per category.

Juxtaposition: One of the most effective ways to express ideas photographically is to compare and contrast subjects by juxtaposing (putting them next to each other). Juxtaposition means capturing the relationship between subjects in a photo so that each part of the image has some bearing on and relates to the other. Comparing and contrasting subjects by juxtaposing them enables the photographer to highlight similarities or dissimilarities among objects. JANUARY PROGRAM SPLIT BETWEEN GERRY BISHOP AND CLAY WITT

Clay Witt, a mixed media artist, has a B.A. from UVA with his thesis work in Painting and Printmaking, and a Master of Fine Arts from the University of Massachusetts. There, he also did thesis work in Painting and Printmaking, with additional coursework in Arabic language and Art History. He has also done two summers of intensive work in Arabic, one at Middlebury College in VT, and the other in Morocco. In 2001 he received a Fulbright Student Grant to Damascus, Syria.

From 2003 to the present, Clay has designed and constructed sets and props for editorial photographic layouts for Time Magazine, New York Magazine, and the New York Times Magazine. He designed and executed Persian and Arabic calligraphy for two films, *The Color* of Love (Iranian/American) and Occupation: Dreamland (American). He has been a Special Projects Assistant at the Institute for International Education, New York, NY where he worked to create a Middle East Fulbright Scholar Alumni group conference and participated in the U.S. orientation of the inaugural group of Iraqi Fulbright students. In a Graduate Teaching Fellowship at the University of Massachusetts, Clay taught Advanced Drawing, Beginning and Advanced Painting, and Intaglio Printmaking to undergraduates. He has studied Arabic Calligraphy and Islamic Thought, and has been restorer and gilder at a gallery in Seattle WA, where he was responsible for the pricing and execution of various antique object and picture frame restoration jobs. And last, but not least, between 1990 and 1992 he designed, fabricated, and installed the interior of the Tokyo Rose nightclub, in Charlottesville.

He has had many exhibits, in Charlottesville, at the Les Yeux du Monde Gallery, the Second Street Gallery, and McGuffey, as well as exhibits in New York, Massachusetts, and Washington State. He has one of the most interesting and varied backgrounds we have seen yet in a judge, and will be our second judge who is an artist rather than a photographer.
