You will receive two points for each entry in the Assigned topic, and one point for entries in the Open and Creative categories. You may submit only ONE (l) entry per category.

Structures: Show us buildings such as offices, churches, cathedrals, memorials, sports complexes, music halls, statues, park structures, bridges, and many more. Explore inside/outside possibilities. Look for unusual design patterns or interesting nooks and crannies. Shoot from many different angles and light conditions; use wide angle, close-up, or anything in between.

In the Making: This theme is about "becoming." It could include anything from an opening flower bud to construction in progress (by human or non-human builders) to a child spreading icing on a cake. Since there are so many possibilities, your challenge will be less in finding an appropriate subject than in creating an image that exhibits imagination and skilled execution.

Steele photographs "what interests him until it no longer interests him," then photographs something else. Most of his work is landscape and figure studies executed with both traditional and digital materials.

He grew up in a small farming community in Missouri and started photographing around the age of 12. He processed his own film in (as he describes) his mother's baking dishes. Over time he began shooting in color slides, but it was always black and white that drew his interest.

He is drawn to the work of Ansel Adams and Edward Weston. He was struck by the magnificence of Adams' western landscapes and the beauty of Weston's nudes. He works primarily in medium and large format, and particularly loves work that has a sense of light. He writes, "Great photographs have a depth and luminosity that makes them come off the paper. Regardless of the subject, that is what I try to achieve in my work."

The vision that resulted from his traditional darkroom background has made it possible for him to easily incorporate digital workflows into the creation of his work. He photographs in

both traditional and digital imaging processes and writes that, "In the end, it's not about the process; it's about the image. It either works or it doesn't."

Jim will present his program, Learning from the Master, a presentation on what we, as photographers, can learn from studying the master painters. Painters start with a blank canvas and create an image. Photographers start with what is in front of them and create an image. Photography is often about removing the unnecessary, like classic sculpture. That said, how viewers see and interpret an image is a function of many factors. This presentation analyzes the work of master painters to see how they combine artistry with composition and light to create the work and how we, as photographers, can learn from studying their techniques.

VICTORIA DYE IUDGES AND PRESENTS AT APRIL MEETING

Victoria judged the April topic of *Marvelously* Mundane and presented a program including several types of images and how she overcomes technical issues to capture them. She began with macro images, many of them wildflowers, and showed the specific steps she goes through to stack them for depth of field. She also talked about the difficulty in macro photography of combining a depth of field wide enough to focus the main subject, yet narrow enough to produce a blurred background that won't distract the viewer. She shoots with a dedicated 100mm 2.8 macro lens, and either uses Photoshop CS5 or Helicon Focus to produce the final product. She was able to show us each step of the process in her presentation.

Victoria also talked about action photos. She recommended using the center focus spot when capturing action as it is faster and more accurate; the photos can be cropped for composition. She also mentioned that only about 10% of action shots are going to be good, so be sure to take lots of pictures.

She emphasized the importance of using a tripod and having a complete understanding of depth of field.

Victoria discussed how to use a wide angle lens (she has a Canon 16-35mm) specifically the importance of having a strong foreground subject in your shot; she uses Nik software for high dynamic range (HDR) in images with a range of exposures that can't be captured by a camera.

She showed us some of her wildlife photography, and also action shots of children skateboarding, and explained the settings on her camera for different kinds of photography, and why she uses them. It was an educational and informative evening, and very interesting to see the steps she goes through to process her images.

Victoria's judging was concise, articulate and to the point. She was matter of fact in her evaluation of the entries, but always mentioned the positive aspects of each image.

I have some ability with technology and have been fairly comfortable with change in my life. So I was surprised at my frustration at trying to understand two new programs. Breathe now. It is OK to stop, slow down, and smell the roses before you take the picture of the rose and photoshop it.

WEDNESDAY EVENING WORKSHOP SCHEDULE

Unless otherwise noted, meetings are on Wednesdays at the Northside Library, from 7:00-8:30 pm.

Saturday, May 5: "Macro Lab" A hands-on follow-up to January presentation.

Demonstrations and practice using macro equipment and techniques. Bring cameras, tripods, and any macro or close-up equipment you have. Inside will be in the Ivy Creek Natural Area Education Building, 9:00--11:00 AM; outside (weather permitting) 11:00--1:00 PM. Gerry Bishop leading. (See opposite for more information.)

Wednesday, May 30: "How to Get the Best from Your Photo Printer," John Hulburt leading.

Wednesday, June 27: "Getting the Right Exposure—and What to Do When You Can't!" How to use your camera controls to get ideal exposures, capturing images when the tonal range of your subject is too great, and how to process these images afterward for the best possible results. Bring your cameras to the workshop for some hands-on instruction and practice. Gerry Bishop presenting.

CCC SILENT AUCTION:

Date and place: June 14, at our regular monthly meeting at the Senior Center.

Time: Sellers must arrive and set up at 5:00 pm. (For those who cannot arrive early, special arrangements can be made.) Sale starts at 5:30 and continues until 7:30 at the latest.

Purpose: Because the club has been using a member's laptop for our meetings and workshops for the past couple of years, the executive committee has decided to hold a silent auction to raise the necessary money to buy a laptop for the exclusive use of the club. Any additional funds raised will go toward buying a spare bulb for our projector.

Procedure for sellers: Bring items to the meeting that you'd like to offer for sale to other members. Tables will be set up and supplies will be available, so all you have to do is come with your items, set them up for display, and fill out tags describing the items.

Procedure for buyers: To bid on an item, you will write your number and the price you're willing to pay for it on the tag next to the item. You may return to the item repeatedly to make higher bids if necessary, up to the time that bidding is closed.

Items for sale will be limited to:

- Photographic equipment and accessories, including cameras, lenses, tripods, filters, strobes, and so on.
- Computer equipment, software, and accessories
- Books and DVDs on photography
- Mounted or framed photographic prints
- One-on-one workshops with expert photographers within the club. Could include instruction in various photography techniques (landscape, macro, action, low-light, portrait, street, studio, etc.), Photoshop and other photo-editing techniques, camera operation,

equipment recommendations, etc. 100% of these revenues will be donated to the club.

• Any other items that may be of interest to other photographers.

Note--All items must be in good, working condition unless the seller explicitly states otherwise.

Rules:

- All buyers and sellers must register and obtain numbers as they arrive.
- Sellers will fill out tags (supplied by club) that describe their items and establish any minimum bids or fixed prices. You also must list the percentage of the sale price you promise to donate to the club.
- Sellers must agree to donate at least 10% of sale revenues to the club. However, any percentage above that amount, including 100%, will be welcome!
- Be sure to bring your checkbook or cash. Credit cards will not be accepted!
- All unsold items must be removed at the end of the auction.

Completing the sales:

- During the evening's judging, volunteers will tally the results and designate the winning bids. At the end of the regular meeting, the volunteer will notify the winning buyers.
- Buyers must pay the sellers the night of the auction, between 8:30 and 9:00, with either cash or check.
- Sellers must submit their donations to the club within 10 days of the sale via checks sent to John Hulburt, the CCC treasurer.




