You will receive two points for each entry in the Assigned topic, and one point for entries in the Open and Creative categories. You may submit only ONE (l) entry per category.

**Roads Less Travelled:** "Off the beaten track," "blue highways," "back roads"--these byways

and the scenes that lie along them provide good subjects for photos that reveal a different texture of life. Get off the main roads and see what you can find. The road itself may or may not be the main subject, and an image may qualify even without a road being visible, but it must suggest "by the side of a back road" to the viewer.

The Blue Moment: Approximately 30 minutes before sunrise or 30 minutes after sunset, if you take a photograph that includes the sky, you may find that you have captured "the blue moment." You can't see this with your own eyes, but your camera can see it. Keep shooting until you have seen it on your LCD screen. (See this issue of the FOCUS for a "How To" article by Deb Snelson, who, last year, presented a workshop on "The Blue Moment.")

Ed's work has been widely exhibited, including a solo exhibition at George Mason University. One of his prints was on exhibit at the Smithsonian Institution in 2003. His work resides in public and private collections, and was also featured on public television's *Photographers of Northern Virginia*.

Ed presented his creativity workshop at the University of Massachusetts for the New England Council of Camera Clubs, Kutztown University for the Berks Camera Club and at Georgetown University. He serves the community by judging photographic shows and competitions.


He has written and coauthored several publications for the *Northern Virginia Alliance* of Camera Clubs. He is also a web site designer and builder. Ed is a Past President of NVPS, and

has served on the board for over 15 years. He has been named "Photographer of the Year" six times. Ed taught photography in Italy, Turkey, England and Germany, and also lectures on photography at area colleges and universities. He has been influenced by the writings and teachings of Freeman Patterson, Joseph Miller, Ernst Haas, John Shaw, Bill Allard and others. #### THE "BLUE MOMENT"

Last week in Ireland I was walking towards a pub for dinner on a dismally dark overcast day and noticed that some exterior lights were emitting a soft glow against the building. I rapidly brought my camera up to take a quick "record" shot of the building; without breaking stride I cranked up the ISO and opened up my aperture to get a shutter speed of 1/30 sec. But what I saw on my LCD monitor stopped me in my tracks! On the screen was the most beautiful blue sky, which was certainly not the way my eye perceived that dismally flat gray scene. I had inadvertently found the "blue moment." The "blue moment," or "blue hour" is the period of twilight (neither full daylight or fully dark) about 30 minutes after sunset or before sunrise and, in spite of its name, usually lasts about 30 minutes. It begins in the Eastern sky and progresses to the West; sky and water both appear a brilliant blue.

Because you don't have much time to catch it, you usually have to plan for it—get to the subject you want to showcase and set up in advance. The best subjects are those that are lit at night—cityscapes, city streets, buildings, bridges, monuments, fountains, etc. For these scenes a wide-angle lens may be best, or

possibly the smallest mm possible on a zoom lens, but photos can be composed using any lens. The best quality photos are shot with the lowest ISO possible to avoid any noise in the beautiful blue sky, and since light is limited it will require a long exposure. That is why a sturdy tripod is essential.

To further increase image quality turn off image stabilization, use mirror lock-up to avoid vibration, and use either a remote shutter release or the 2 second timer. I primarily shoot in aperture priority at f/16 or smaller to get the starburst pattern from the lights. Focusing is the most critical element. Be sure to gain focus while the light is not too dim—if you will be staying stationary you can autofocus then switch to manual focus, being careful not to bump the focus ring after that. If you move about keep all focus points active, and once you can no longer autofocus you can use live view and manual focus, or use a torch to illuminate your subject enough to focus—whatever works in the situation.

After taking your first shot, be sure to check the LCD to determine if you have captured the blue moment. You may have to take several photos over a brief period of time until you see the blue. Once you start shooting the blue, consult your LCD after nearly every shot to tweak your exposure so as to not excessively blow out the lights—the center of the lights will be blown out (use your blinkies) but these should only be pinpoints. Correct the exposure with exposure compensation if you are using aperture priority, or change your manual exposure settings as needed. Voila—beautiful photos!



NATURE VISIONS 2012 will be held November 9 - 11, at the Hylton Performing Arts Center on the Prince William Campus, George Mason University, Manassas, Virginia. The Expo is a three day event showcasing the photographic work of Northern Virginia's wildlife photographers. The centerpiece of the Expo is a display of approximately three hundred images that have been selected by a panel of jurors.

The Expo also offers two full days of lectures and workshops by noted photographers and several unique activities including photographers having the chance to photograph hawks, owls and other raptors. Thanks to the *Raptor Conservancy of Virginia*, photographers can focus their cameras on these magnificent wild birds in a natural setting just outside the Hylton Center. Numerous vendors will be on hand to display the latest in photographic equipment and technology.

The Expo will kick off on Friday, November 9 with a full day seminar conducted by Seth Resnick. Seth is considered one of the 30 most influential photographers of the decade and is one of 78 photographers worldwide named as a "Canon Explorer of Light" photographer. Seth will also give the keynote address on Saturday afternoon. Lectures will be held all day Saturday and Sunday.
