ERWIN BOHMFALK VISITS CCC IN JANUARY

Dr. Bohmfalk began photography in high school and has been taking pictures for over 70 years of his interesting and adventurous life, which has included a stint as an Army pilot in WWII, a Ph.D. in Chemistry, working for DuPont, starting the Purple Foot restaurant in Waynesboro, twenty-two years as the Chair of the Board of Directors of the Virginia Wildlife Center, and a leader of photo and viewing safaris all over the world. Over the years he has been to all seven continents. His favorite parts of the world are the Poles, and he was able to share many images from both the North and the South poles during his visit to CCC.

Erwin has never taken a course in photography, but rather learned through experience.

Although he insisted that most of his photography is "grab shooting," he interspersed

informational and travel photos with some magnificently beautiful shots, all perfectly composed, in beautiful light, and focused! The first photo he showed us was a picture of him as a one-year-old, taken in 1925. He and his parents were ready to climb into a Model T Ford to travel over a pass on Fall River Road in Colorado. He said the photo was taken with a Brownie camera.

The presentation shared his experiences with photography during the war, trips he has taken to several continents and the poles, and photographing a book on birds of South Africa.

In 1992 he was involved with a group that chartered a nuclear Russian ice breaker that was able to take them through the Bering Strait, and visit several parts of Russia. One of my favorite photos was of some of the Russian crew swimming, sans suits or protective gear, around a small floating slab of ice, and toasting each other with champagne in fancy glasses while they were as directly over the North Pole as they could figure.

We were very lucky to be there to hear about some of his adventures; I am sure most of us walked away wondering if we could invite him back soon, to learn about more of his experiences.

PROJECTION

You will receive two points for each entry in the Assigned topic, and one point for entries in the Open and Creative categories. You may submit only ONE (l) entry per category.

LESS IS MORE: This is a theme about minimalism--the art of spareness and purity. Winning photos will reveal the beauty of a subject stripped down to its most basic form and context. Your goal will be to capture the essence of something, to express the best aspects of a subject with minimum content and maximum simplicity--a single leaf floating on a pond, a small child in a large and empty room, a footprint in the sand.

GENERATIONS: When we think of photographing generations, beautiful images of large wrinkled hands cupping baby-soft infant hands may first come to mind. While people are a great subject for this assignment, feel free to explore other types of generational juxtapositions as well. Consider an old \$1 bill next to a new \$1 coin, a classic book next to an electronic reader, or a sparkling new building replacing a crumbling structure.

VICTORIA DYE FIRST JUDGE OF 2013

Local photographer Victoria Dye judged the January theme of Celebrations. Victoria is a familiar face at CCC, and has judged and presented programs several times. She handled the 56 entries concisely and efficiently, although she is clearly more comfortable with fine art nature, and animal photography.

NORTHERN VIRGINIA PHOTOGRAPHER **TUAN PHAM TO PRESENT PROGRAM**

Our presenter for February, Tuan Pham, arrived in the US the day President Richard Nixon resigned. After his studies at UMD in College Park, he worked in banking and as a mediator; after graduation from Leadership Montgomery, he served two Maryland governors as an unpaid commissioner.

Tuan bought his first camera and joined NVPS in 2005. By 2010 he had won numerous ribbons, and had more images juried in the Meadowlark Photography Expo in Northern VA that year than most participating artists. He lucked out again in 2012, with the most images juried in the Joe Miller Photographic Art Center's Second Annual Abstract Exhibition. Tuan's approach to photography was the subject of an article in Elan Magazine, December, 2012, called "The Art of Seeing."

As a photographer, Tuan likes to take pictures the easy way, not having to climb mountains or wake up before sunrise. He opens his eye and

heart to everyday subjects and draws immense joy from them, with or without the camera. He receives inspiration from the works of impressionist painters and the teachings of Buddhist ancestors on "wise attention." Now retired, Tuan lives in Annandale, VA, close to his twelve grandchildren.

Tuan's program, titled "Photos of Nothing," is about a visual adventure born out of deep disappointment. He writes that, "The disappointment soon gives way to surprises, amazement, and equally deep insights. The subject matters conventionally deemed insubstantial and insignificant begin to reveal their freshness and other hidden attributes. Each photo opportunity bears witness to a deep connection between the photographer and his subjects. The adventure suddenly (becomes) a proving ground for the eye to learn to see nature in the unprejudiced way, and for the artist within to come out and play, without the overshadow of the glamour of tools and techniques, and the internal critic.

"The presentation begins with a quick visit to the birthplace of creativity, to be followed by the presenter's account of his journey--his activities on the ground and on the bus, his discovery of the beauty of the ordinary, and the invaluable insights on seeing. The presentation closes with a slideshow of 40 images of visual poetry and graphic metaphors that reveal the photographer's artistic personality. The presentation will end with a Q & A period."

IERRY COULTER WILL BE FEBRUARY'S JUDGE

In October, 2011, artist" Jerry Coulter was an excellent judge for CCC. A retired professor of art at JMU, Jerry looked more at the general balance, composition, space, color and light that he envisions as a painter, and less of the photographer's specific craft of light, exposure, tonal range, horizons, etc. that fellow photographers include when they judge, according to their standards. He specifically

mentioned geometry and patterns complimenting each other, that warm colors advance and cool colors recede, the importance of being able to identify the main subject, and the path the viewer's eyes take as they move through an image. He mentioned that several of the entered images were too simple, and didn't include enough information to interest the viewer. It will be interesting to see what he thinks about our February topic of "Less is More."

From an early age, Jerry enjoyed expressing himself through drawing and painting. After graduating from high school, he was drafted into the US Army where he served for two years. When his term was completed, Jerry received the GI Bill and dedicated the benefits towards studying art at Furman University. It was here that he became interested in the figure as a subject for his work. Encouraged by his professors, Jerry received a fellowship at Ohio University where he continued to develop his interest in figure painting and drawing and pursued an increasing interest in non-objective painting. After graduating with an MFA in

painting, he began his career as an art professor and artist.

Jerry taught undergraduate and graduate students for more than 40 years. Although he is now retired, he continues to work in his studio and teach a summer workshop at Orkney Springs, a program he has taught and directed for 26 years.

As a painter, Jerry's vocabulary is visual form and thus he sees a strong connection, rather than division, between realistic and non-objective subject matter. The subject matter in his work appeals to the viewer on various levels, but his hope is that the viewer responds to the work on an esthetic, as well as an emotional, level by engaging with the various forms represented. 


