MAX LYONS SCHEDULED FOR AUGUST

Max Lyons was born in Belgium and grew up in England and the United States. After completing graduate studies in Economics, Lyons worked briefly in Washington as a policy analyst before becoming interested in both photography and technology.

Lyons' interest in creating photographs started in the mid '90s with the advent of consumerlevel digital photography. He was inspired by the freedom to experiment that this new technology allowed, and developed interests in both architectural and landscape photography. By 2000, Lyons was becoming intrigued by the visual impact provided by very large photographic prints. He was influenced by the large format works of film photographers such as Andreas Gursky and Thomas Struth...two artists pushing the limits of large format photography. However, Lyons was also becoming frustrated with a serious limitation of digital photography—its relatively low resolution, and inability to capture sharp, detailed, large images.

In early 2001, Lyons stumbled upon an innovative solution to the limited resolution of

digital cameras, in the form of "stitched" images -- composite images created by joining together multiple images. Lyons realized that this technique could be used to create photographs with much greater clarity than any single digital or film image. Lyons embarked on a multi-year, and ongoing, effort to create a portfolio of incredibly detailed, high resolution images.

He has also received "Photographer of the Year" awards in both color and black and white print categories from the Manassas Warrenton Camera club. Titled *Digital Photography in the Garden* the topic included the basics of garden photography, such as: use a tripod; maximize natural light (white balance control); use manual focus for precise target; control for wind with a light box; and experiment with different apertures for the most appropriate depth of field. He talked about specific guidelines and tips for composition, macro photography and equipment, and all of the materials and steps used to build your own light box.

PROJECTED

You will receive <u>two points</u> for each entry in the Assigned topic, and <u>one point</u> for entries in the Open and Creative categories. <u>You may submit only ONE (I) entry per category.</u>

FIND A FACE: If you look hard enough, you can find a face in the most unexpected places; on a light switch, a shoe, a cardboard box, in a used

car part, a rock, some clouds, a tree, or vegetables. Cheese graters wearing grins? A cookie cutter with a surprised look and a large red clown nose? How about a shoe heel with round eyes and a smiley mouth? Look around. They're everywhere! No "real" faces allowed in this assignment; faces must be "found," not composed.

REFLECTIONS: Including reflections in your photography can lead to some amazing effects and images. Water (inside or out), windows, ice, mirrors, silver bowls or ladles, shiny waxed furniture, or any other reflective surface can change an image from a straightforward photo into a work of art--richer, more abstract, or otherwise more artistic. FIND A FACE: THE NEXT ASSIGNED TOPICBy Gerry Bishop

In the description of the Assigned competition category for July, the final sentence reads as follows: "No 'real' faces allowed in this assignment; faces must be 'found,' not composed."

Following a competition in which a good number of members didn't know what we meant by a silhouette, we thought we should clearly define our terms for the upcoming competition.

By "no 'real' faces" we mean no actual faces of people or animals, but rather things that mimic a real face in some way. Several examples were provided in the full description of the assignment. Should be clear enough, right? If not, here's a photo that would qualify as an entry:



But what do we mean by "found, not composed"? We mean that the photographer can't create a face-like image by arranging items in a certain way. And it should go without saying that a face-like image can't be created in Photoshop. We also mean that you can't enter a photograph of a face that has been created by someone else. A good example of an image that would *not* qualify is this:

We're now screening images before the competitions:

Have an image you're not sure fits the criteria? Then please take advantage of the services of our screening committee, as described in the following:

Background

The Charlottesville Camera Club is an organization that fosters photography as an art, a hobby, and a vocation, by instruction and by sharing of knowledge and experience. Our monthly competitions are one way in which we fulfill this mission. To ensure that all images compete on an equal footing, it is important for club members to understand and abide by the rules applying to each category of competition – Assigned, Open, and Creative.

There have been times, however, when a club member has entered an image in an Assigned competition that doesn't fit the category theme, or a member has entered an image in an Assigned or Open category that should have been entered in the Creative category, or vice versa. This has led to images being disqualified before the judging begins. Or, because our judges may not fully understand the parameters of our categories, it has resulted in poor decisions during the judging process.

Therefore, to help avoid problems before and during judging, to enable members to ascertain the appropriateness of their images, and to enable members to enter replacement images that better fit the categories, the Executive Committee has decided to give members a chance to have any questionable images evaluated for appropriateness before the competition.

Procedure

• If you have any question about whether an image you plan on entering in a competition qualifies for the category, you are encouraged to e-mail a copy of the image to a screening committee composed of experienced club members, selected by the Executive Committee. (See list below.) The screening

committee will review the image and either assure you that the image is appropriate, recommend that you enter the image in another category, or suggest that you enter a replacement in the original category. For projected images, you must complete this process before the deadline for uploading images to PhotoContest Pro. For images to be entered as prints, you should allow enough time for selecting, printing, and matting an alternative.

• On the evening of the competition, the screening committee will review all images before the judging begins to ensure that they suit the assignment for the evening and are in the proper categories. If an image you've entered appears questionable, a committee member will discuss it with you. This could lead to your image being moved to another category, if possible, or being disqualified. In the latter case, you would not have an opportunity to enter a replacement in the original category.

BASIC STEPS TO BETTER PHOTOS: PART III IMAGE EDITING

On July 16, Gerry Bishop, with Lightroom input from Deb Snelson, presented Part 3 of the four part series of workshops. He pointed out that after the capture, in this age of digital photography, you are really only half done, and in order to use the software available, you have to learn it!

Gerry's purpose in this short workshop was to show the audience what can be done to enhance images. Actually becoming an expert in manipulating photographs undoubtedly takes hours of practice, and a full length course or three! Most of us are hoping for somewhere in between.

Gerry explained the difference between a RAW image and a jpg., and talked about some of the basics of manipulating an image in CS5. He demonstrated how to crop, how to use content aware, dodge and burn, saturation vs. vibrance, blending two exposures, straightening an image, converting to B&W, and some of the creative filters. The before and after shots of

the photos he had enhanced, and a demonstration on his laptop of the actual process were very helpful in the presentation. It was easy to see how important it is to use a "digital darkroom" before displaying a photograph.

Although Gerry feels that Photoshop CS is the best software editing program, Deb would attest that Lightroom is more intuitive and easier to use. (It's a little like being sure that either Canon or Nikon makes the best cameras!) Deb walked the class through processing workflow in Lightroom4's Develop Module, paying attention to the histogram to make adjustments with LR's easy to use sliders; she showed a few tricks with the various tools, but, unfortunately, was not able to finish because of time constraints.




