STEVE BELTZ TO SPEAK AND JUDGE IN SEPTEMBER

CCC is pleased to welcome Steve Beltz, who will present a program on crime scene and surveillance photography. In this presentation, the attendees will receive an overview of crime scene and surveillance photography and the tools used by detectives and other professionals in this field. Steve Beltz has been involved in photography for over 30 years. He put his skills to good use while he was employed for the Washington State Patrol as a Detective Sergeant. Steve spent many years examining and documenting numerous types of serious crimes as well as being involved in surveillance photography of various criminal entities. Crime scenes and surveillance photography represent special challenges for photographers including low light, poor weather and cramped spaces. In the Virginia area, Steve has worked at the U.S. Department of State and the Department of Defense and specialized in computer, audio and video forensics where he uses his computer and photography skills to enhance video, photo and audio files. Steve has taught photography to all levels of government and has a strong foundation in the use of Photoshop CS6.

ANDREW JEZIORO JUDGES AUGUST ASSIGNED TOPIC

Andy Jezioro has been involved in photography since the 50's. That showed in his expert judging of "Found Faces" at the August

meeting. He went through approximately 60 images, making a few succinct and pertinent comments about each. He spent more time on entries in the B category, offering suggestions on what might have improved the images, while maintaining a very positive critique.

MAX LYONS PRESENTS PROGRAM ON NIGHT PHOTOGRAPHY

Max Lyons was the August CCC guest speaker, and presented a program on several different aspects of night photography, with forays into stitching many images together to make one large print.

Lyons' interest in creating photographs started in the mid '90s with the advent of consumer-level digital photography. He was inspired by the freedom to experiment that this new technology allowed, and developed interests in both architectural and landscape photography. However, he became frustrated with the relatively low resolution and inability to capture sharp, detailed images, of early digital photography.

Lyons is a computer programmer by profession, and in early 2001, he put his computer and photographic talents together and created an innovative solution to the limited resolution of digital cameras in the form of "stitched" images—composite images created by joining together multiple photos. He used this technique to create photographs with much greater clarity than any single digital or film image. Although he uses image stacking in all of his photography, his presentation covered several aspects of night photography, such as The Blue Hour, full night photography, shooting by moonlight, taking photos of the moon, Northern Lights, and stars and star trails. He

showed us many images and gave clear explanations of his procedures. We enjoyed meeting him and his wife.

The August meeting of the Charlottesville Camera Club was called to order at 6:30 pm by President, Gordan Putnam. John Hulburt reported \$3647.52 in the club bank account. John announced a meeting of the exhibition team at 7 pm on August 20, at the Northside Library and invited all to attend. Gerry Bishop reminded everyone of the peer review workshop at 2 pm on Aug 17 at the Northside Library, and the 4th installment of the workshop Basic Steps to Better Photos, at 6:30 pm, also at the Northside Library. Gerry also announced a special meeting of the camera club on August 27, at 6:30 pm at the Northside Library to demonstrate a possible change in judge scoring. The current President of the Manassas-Warrenton Camera Club will be judging images using the scoring system his club and many other clubs use. All members are invited to attend and ask questions, to be fully informed before voting on a change to the new system. In response to requests for a directory of members, Gordan announced that a new online directory would soon be available that is

"self correcting." Jim Fergus introduced the judge, Andrew Jezioro. Mr. Jezioro is a past president of the Manassas-Warrenton Camera Club and was in that position when their club switched to the new system 4-5 years ago. He spoke very highly of the system, pointing out that this system was used exclusively in England, and stressing that members would effectively compete against themselves which is more satisfying. The judging was followed by a presentation by Max Lyons on Night Photography.

WORKSHOP ON VISUAL LITERACY

Do your photos deliver the message you intended when you took them? What should you do to see that a photo conveys what you want? An upcoming workshop may help you address this problem.

The leader will be Jim Steele, an art photographer who was our judge and presenter last April. Jim and his wife Kathryn have Studio 343 at the Torpedo Factory Art Center in Alexandria, Virginia. You can view his work on their website http://www.photographybysteele.com/

This six-hour workshop is designed to help photographers develop "visual literacy," the ability to analyze an image to determine what it needs in order to make the statement the photographer wishes. Jim will demonstrate how he uses digital workflows for color and monochrome photos, not as a set of "how to's" or techniques but to enable participants to realize their own vision. The instructor will take the class through the analysis of his images and the resulting changes he made. He also will work with images provided by participants as a basis for class discussion and demonstrations. The workshop will include preparation for printing and tips for printing photos of various subjects.

No computer is required for the class. Photoshop will be used in class demonstrations but references will be made for Lightroom and Photoshop Elements. The cost of the workshop is \$125; CCC is providing a subsidy to reduce the cost to \$99 for members. The workshop will be held from 9 am to 4 pm on Saturday, November 2, at ACAC in Albemarle Square. GERRY BISHOP PRESENTS WORKSHOP IV

Gerry's series of four Basic Steps to Better Photos workshops ended August 21, with Taking Control of your Camera. He began with "The world's first photograph!!" and quickly moved us up to the present world of digital photography and DSLR's. He explained aperture and shutter speed, and how they are related to each other and to depth of field, and then went on to go over exposure modes. He had the audience take out their cameras and try out different apertures and shutter speeds. He illustrated his explanations with photos showing the differences between large and small apertures, and fast and slow shutter speed. Gerry also covered metering methods, exposure, exposure compensation,

histograms—what they are and how to read them—and how to recognize noise and what causes it.
