In an effort to take greater advantage of the capabilities of the CCC website (and to save the FOCUS editorial staff duplicative effort), the Executive Committee has approved a project to migrate the monthly FOCUS newsletter from its current PDF format to a true on-line, digital newsletter. What that means to you, the reader, is that you will still receive an email containing a link to the new issue each month. However, when you click on that link, you will be taken to a page on the CCC website where the new content will be displayed for your reading pleasure. Should you wish to print a copy, you will still be able to do so. What this change means for those dedicated souls who create the content is that they will only have to write each piece once and file it away in its appropriate spot in the website library. When it is time to 'publish' the next addition of the FOCUS, software running behind the scenes will aggregate all the designated content into the final product for viewing or printing. A side benefit of this change is that there will be places on the CCC website where visitors can browse through articles on a single topic such as past meeting minutes, recaps of competition judging, or past workshops and field trips. As we make this transition, please feel free to offer comments and suggestions to any member of the Executive Committee.

He judged images fairly and was able to make specific suggestions on how they could be improved. He paid particular attention to such things as the edges of a photo, backgrounds, depth of field, and perspective. Brian's stamina and attention to his "job" for the day is to be admired!

Approximately 18 members of CCC took advantage of Brian Zwit's expertise in using the Nik software package. He is organized,



We brought our laptops, plugged in, and got to work, beginning promptly at 9:00 and, aside from an occasional break, not stopping until 5:00. Brian not only teaches the mechanics, but encourages his students to "fool around" and experiment—to have fun. It would be well worth it for the club to explore additional possibilities for workshops. At this point the budget allows us to subsidize a paid workshop. We benefit from true experts, a different point of view, and a fresh perspective.

The judge for our next meeting is Wayne Wolfersberger, an accomplished nature photographer and proprietor of *Nature Is Wild Photography* in Northern Virginia, specializing in photography for print media, photography classes and workshops. His background includes service as a park ranger at Yellowstone National Park.



Wayne grew up in the Washington, DC area. He attended local universities and graduated with degrees in biology and conservation from the University of Maryland and George Mason University. He obtained valuable experience as a photographer while working for a commercial photographer and later with the U.S. Navy Photo Laboratory and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Wayne has taught biology and earth science in Virginia, Maryland, and in the United Kingdom under the Fulbright Program. The use of photography to teach concepts to his classes became second nature. After leaving full-time teaching, Wayne became an adjunct professor with Virginia Tech.

In addition to judging our competition, Wayne will present a program titled "Making Movies with a DSLR."

ASSIIGNMENT: ARCHITECTURAL DETAILS

At the March 12 meeting, please submit only <u>TWO</u> entries. Choose among Assigned (projected), Open (projected or printed,) and "Innovative" (projected).

WHAT IS THAT? Something unusual or unfamiliar, and hard to identify should tend to evoke a response of "What is that?" from a viewer. Any unfamiliar or unusual object, or part of an object, qualifies. While "macro" (extreme close-up) might seem to be the default, try thinking "outside the box."

ARCHITECTUAL DETAILS: Although the main focus within architectural photography is usually a building as a whole, it can also be interesting to approach the subject on a smaller scale. Look for details that will make interesting photos on their own. Shoot at creative angles to produce something unique, and pay special attention to light that may bring out details and create shadows.

The calendar says March 2, but as I look around the outside areas of my house and see a lot of snow still on the ground, I am reminded that spring is still several weeks away! However, we can all look forward to brighter days and warming and fresher air to breathe, and signs of spring's awakening. I can hardly wait!

Recently our Executive Committee had to make some difficult decisions regarding our monthly competitions. These changes were not made lightly. The committee members spent a lot of time weighing the pros and cons of such decisions, and feel they were made in the best interests of all of members.

First, beginning with our March competition, our rules have been modified by eliminating restrictions on the size and medium of print presentations. This means photographers may submit prints of any reasonable size on any photographic medium including canvas on stretchers, acrylic, metallic paper, aluminum or other new media introduced in the world of digital photography. This should allow those entering prints in our competitions a wide range of print making, and we look forward to seeing them.

Second, the number of entries in our January and February competitions (especially February - 75 projections and prints) created situations where the speaker's presentation had to be curtailed. We actually had to cancel the presentation at our February meeting. To ensure that adequate time remains for the educational presentations we have enjoyed over the years, effective with the March monthly competition, photographers may now enter a total of only two images. The rule of only one image per category still stands, so you will no longer be able to enter an image in all three of the categories. Since we have already invited speakers as well as judges, for the next several months, we need to see if the number of entries falls off enough to reinstate the three entry opportunity. We want to avoid, at all costs, having a speaker spend the time to

prepare a presentation and not have time to present it!

Let me assure you that our Executive Committee will monitor closely any and all effects these modifications have on our monthly competitions and make adjustments as needed.

Now – for those long awaited spring days, get your cameras and gear ready to go out and enjoy the air, and shoot, shoot, shoot!!!!!
