MARY ANN SUTTON TO JUDGE MARCH COMPETITION

Mary Ann Sutton, who was prevented from judging our end-of-year competition in December due to bad weather, will be here to judge for us on March 13. Her husband, Dick, will also be here to enjoy the evening.

Mary Ann is both a past Vice President for Competitions and Past President of the Northern Virginia Photographic Society (NVPS). She is a 1995 graduate of the Washington School of Photography and has augmented that training with many photography and Adobe Photoshop courses, including the famed Freeman Patterson's Photography and Visual Design Workshop, in 2007.

Mary Ann worked as a professional photographer and videographer from 1997 to 2009 and for several years ran a portrait studio in her home. She also has completed the Joseph Miller Center for the Photographic Arts judging seminar.


Mary Ann's images have won numerous awards in the Northern Virginia Photographic Society

competitions and Vienna photography shows, where she won "Best In Show" in 2001. She was named NVPS "Photographer of the Year" in both 2005 and 2006 in the category of Enhanced Prints and won two "Print of the Year" awards in 2000 and two again in the 2005. Her image "All Truckered Out" won first place in the AAA World 2009 photo contest. Several of her images were juried into the Art League of Alexandria's monthly exhibits at The Torpedo Factory, where she also won a prestigious Equal Award in 2002. In 2011 her prints were juried into both Joe Miller's abstract art exhibit and The Blue Ridge Mountain Arts Council spring photography show.

Mary Ann and her husband live in the northern Shenandoah Valley area, where she has organized and leads a photography club in her active adult community, frequently teaching and encouraging novice photographers. While she continues to do some professional work in photo restoration and in creating portraits, fine art prints, and greeting and note cards, she spends the majority of her photographic time honing her craft by working on photographic art and trying to stay current with her favorite software, Photoshop.

DR. MARSHALL FAINTICH TO PRESENT AT MARCH MEETING

Dr. Marshall Faintich is the author of *A Photographic Guide to the Birds of Wintergreen* and is listed in the Virginia Society of Ornithology's Speakers Directory. His wildlife photos have appeared in newspapers, magazines, websites, government reports and presentations, and on wildlife and birding trail signs in Virginia and Maryland. His own website contains more than 5,000 of his wildlife photos and gets about two million hits per year from visitors in more than 80 countries around the world.

His hour-long presentation of some of his best photographs, "The Birds of Wintergreen," highlights 150 of the more than 220 species that can be seen in central Virginia. He plans to bring along a few copies of his book that will be available for purchase and signing at the meeting. FEBRUARY'S JUDGING, WITH MATTHEW SCHMIDT

The Northern Virginia Photographic Society in Dunn Loring, Virginia, is very lucky to have Matthew Schmidt as one of its Web masters. Besides managing the NVPS website, he has been the Digital Competition Coordinator and Photographic Society of America representative. He attended PSA's image analysis course and Joe Miller's judging seminar many times. This was evident in his analysis of our images. An avid amateur photographer, he is constantly exploring new ways to incorporate artistic interpretations into his work.

"I used to hate abstracts," Matt said as he began winning us over to his admiration of the work of Wassili Kandinsky, the first purely abstract painter. Matt talked about how Kandinsky used the power of circles, squares, and triangles, along with harmonious colors, to compose images of inner resonance. Jackson Pollock's surface textures and implied perspectives of his Blue Poles play with size, depth of field, and tonal change. The unforgettable Nude Descending a Staircase, No. 2, by Marcel Duchamp, depicts motion by overlaying images inspired by photography and has, in turn, become an inspiration to photographers.

Matt explained some of the different camera techniques he uses to create abstract images: placing flowers on a light table and shooting them with a macro lens, using colored gels to transform cut glass pieces into saturated shapes and then turning them into a montage, using a telephoto lenses to soften backgrounds, and tossing a camera into the air to turn colored light sources into swirling designs. He also enjoys making montages as a way to "explore the inner feeling one can achieve with abstracts."

Matt likes to shoot action, landscapes, and motor sports, but he spends the colder months mostly playing with macros. He described some of the basics of macro photography, pointing out the challenges of shooting greatly magnified images (shallow depth of field, loss of light, and motion of camera and/or subject), and the equipment and techniques necessary for success (sturdy tripod, remote shutter release, image stacking, etc.). He has worked up many presets for Adobe Lightroom and Photoshop to make his post-processing easier and more fun.

WORKSHOP ROUNDUP by Gerry Bishop

We held two successful workshops in February—one a "Peer Review" session on Saturday the 22nd and the other a presentation and discussion on how to prepare and upload images to the PhotoContest Pro website for projection during our monthly competitions.

Our peer review sessions, where members bring images to show and ask for input from their peers, continue to draw a devoted and enthusiastic crowd of about 15. While an image is projected, the photographer talks about what he or she was trying to capture, the challenges encountered during that capture, and how he or she tried to improve the image with editing software. Members of the group then offer their impressions of the image, including everything from high helpful suggestions praise for improvement.

Those who regularly attend these sessions have expressed their appreciation for how much they learn from them. Those showing their images say they get valuable feedback,

and those providing the feedback gain skills in evaluating all aspects of an image. This not only helps them appreciate the challenges our judges face during our monthly competitions, but it is also invaluable in learning how to evaluate—and thereby improve—their own photography. A big bonus is seeing, right in front of them and on their own images, how subtle edits with Photoshop (Elements, CS/CC, and Lightroom) and the awesome Nik Collection can make huge improvements in the final image.

The peer review sessions are successful, in part, because the groups are relatively small, giving everyone the opportunity (but not obligation!) to participate. But given the obvious value of these sessions, we encourage more of our members to attend.

Our workshop on preparing and uploading images to PhotoContest Pro went very well, providing an opportunity for members to learn or simply review the best ways to prepare images in different forms of

software and upload them without any glitches. A free-form Q & A session on a wide range of photographic subjects

followed, allowing all to gain even more from the meeting.
